

Rooted Simply Word Study: Deny

Matthew 16:24

“If anyone wants to come after Me, he must **deny** himself, take up his cross, and follow Me.”

The word “**deny**” here is far more intense than simply saying “no” to something. In Greek, it carries a depth that reshapes identity, loyalty, and daily living.

The Greek Word: ἀπαρνέομαι (aparneomai)

Meaning

The verb ἀπαρνέομαι means:

To **disown**

To **renounce**

To **refuse association with**

To **reject any claim someone or something has on you**

It’s the same word used when Peter **denies** Jesus—he doesn’t just avoid Him; he **disowns** Him.

So when Jesus uses this word, He’s calling for something far deeper than self-restraint. He’s calling for a decisive break.

How the Word Functions in the Verse

“Deny himself” means:

Renouncing self as the **center** of life

Rejecting the rule of the **old self**

Disowning the idea that your life belongs to you

Surrendering personal agendas, rights, and claims
